Reception children have had a busy start to Term 5!

We have started our topic on Birds and have been exploring this through our key texts 'Lost and Found' and 'Owl Babies'. The children have developed their fine motor skills by creating their own bird feeders, creating bird nests out of construction materials and retelling the story using props.

As part of the PE curriculum, the children have been fortunate enough to have Fox Cycling come in every week to work with them on balance bikes. The children have been developing their coordination and balance and it has been a joy to see them so engaged and enthusiastic about the sessions. It is something that the children (and staff!) look forward to each week and we cannot wait to see their continued progress over the next few weeks.









This term, Year 1 have been focussing on the work of Andy Goldsworthy in our art lessons. We have created our own temporary sculptures using natural materials. We also studied some of his examples of land art, developing our own responses to what we have noticed in terms of shape, colour and pattern. We have practiced our observational skills through sketching natural materials that he uses such as cones, leaves, shells and stones.



















In our RE lessons this half term, year 2 have started learning about Sikhism. Our first lesson began with learning about the founder of Sikhism, Guru Nanak. The children created a story map about Guru Nanak's life and the events that led him to begin the religion of Sikhism. Next, we focused on the six main beliefs of the religion and compared them to those of Christianity.

Worship Leader, Stanley said "the important person that started Sikhism was Guru Nanak, he started the religion in India."

Another Worship leader, Ava said "Sikhs do not have pictures of God because they do not know if he is a boy or a girl. They also believe that everyone is equal."

Finally, worship leader Sophie knew that "Guru Nanak disappeared for three days and returned talking of his visit to God."





'We are scientists!'

In science this term, year 3 have been busy learning all about forces, friction and magnets. To start, we learnt how force can affect motion. Then, as scientists, we set up an experiment to find out whether different surfaces could slow down the speed of an object. Using a wooden ramp with four different surfaces, year 3 found that the rougher the surface the greater the friction.





What an incredible start to term 5 year 4 have had! Our first residential to Mendip proved to be a roaring success and we were incredibly proud of all the pupils' behaviour, perseverance and sense of fun during trip.

Kicking off with tobogganing, it was a pleasure to see all three classes taking a speedy turn down the slopes where there were even a few races between the pupils and teachers. This was followed by frisbee golf where many pupils relished the opportunity a try and get a Frisbee 'throw in one' on a picturesque course that was very enjoyable to explore.

Later on that first day, we had a long walk to the quarry (we were very impressed by the pupils' stamina) where we took to the cliffs to climb. We were overwhelmed by the bravery and resilience of the children, many of whom overcame some fears around heights.

We had a very good night's sleep on the whole after that very busy first day and we all embraced the active archery activity the following day. The year 4 teachers even found themselves becoming targets for some of the children!

Back in the classroom, we have been studying very useful life skills including mastering the skills of telling the time and reading our exciting new text, Beowulf.

In addition to this, we appreciate all of the toilet rolls that were donated to help create our Barbara Hepworth inspired sculptures in art that many parents admired during our recent share session. On the latter point, it was wonderful to welcome you all back into the classroom as it has been a long time since we have been able to show all of the incredible work the pupils have done. We look forward to sharing more with you very soon.

It really was a lot of fun!

















In year 5, the children have loved learning about the Victorian era through our English text 'Oliver Twist'. They have written fantastic first-person narratives and we cannot wait to share these with you at our upcoming share session. In RE, the children have enjoyed exploring a new religion (Islam) and making comparisons to Christianity. They have learned about Salah (prayer) and the features of the Mosque. By interpreting graphs and Venn diagrams, children have learned about energy and sustainability in geography and have dissected plants in science to explore reproduction.





Inspired by speeches read in parliament, we wrote our own. They included repetition, emotive language and rhetorical questions to develop powerful speeches.
