We hope you all have a very merry Christmas and look forward to welcoming you all back in January.






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# Year 1

In Year 1 this term, we have been learning to retell traditional tales such as The Gingerbread Man, The Three Little Pigs and The Nutcracker. We have become expert storytellers using story maps and actions to help us. We have also been practising our writing skills when writing about characters in the tales such as The Gingerbread Man and The Nutcracker. We have been working on our letter formation as well as thinking carefully about nouns, verbs and adjectives to create a sentence.



In History, we have been learning about The Great Fire of London. We have developed the skills of expert historians by investigating, observing, asking questions and looking at evidence. We now know that Samuel Pepys was a significant person who lived in 1666 during The Great Fire of London and, thanks to his diary, we were able to discover that the fire started in a bakery in Pudding Lane. Travelling back in time, we pretended to put out the fire using traditional methods and this allowed us to see that teamwork was key in helping put the fire out, which links with our value of Co-operation.



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## Year 2

Year 2 have had a fabulous term of learning. Across the term, we have been developing our skills as artists with the expert guidance of our resident artist Miss Phippen and have created incredible owl portraits using soft pastels inspired by the local artist, Mandi Baka-Murray. We are really proud of our observational skills and our use of mark making techniques to create different effects. Can you see how closely we have portrayed the features in the original picture?



Recently, Year 2 had an extra special fun-filled Friday where we enjoyed a Design and Technology day! We learnt some new technical knowledge about vehicles, which enabled us to design and make them using chosen methods and resources to create wheels and axles to make our vehicles move. It was the excellent co-operation, problem solving skills and masterful teamwork which made for such a successful day. 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# Year 3

It has been a busy but exciting term in Year 3. We've been lucky enough to go on a trip to the Bristol Old Vic to watch The Nutcracker. Although it was a very different adaptation to the version we have been learning in class, we enjoyed seeing someone else's interpretation of the story. We had such an amazing time together. The teachers were proud of the children who were so sensible and respectful and were able to show off how amazing St Peter's children are.



We have been busy with our history learning this year all about the stone age and how life has changed over the years. We even got to do some writing about how the first drawing was created, which was so exciting and interesting to find out. We retold the story of *The First Drawing* and wrote our own version of the events.



In our science learning, we've been thinking about our bodies and how amazing they are! The children have designed a healthy meal and thought about all the different types of nutrients and food groups our bodies need. In the last two weeks, we've thought about the bones in our body and how our muscles help us to move.

It's been an amazing term and we can't wait for our learning after Christmas!



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## Year 4

This term, Year 4 went on an exciting trip to St Peter's Church to take part in their yearly Star Trail. We experienced what it would be like for the Three Wise Men to make their journey following the star to Bethlehem. We learned all about gold, frankincense and myrrh and explored lots of interesting items (like compasses and telescopes) that travellers can use to help them on their journeys.



In our art lessons, we have been producing some fantastic tiger art linked to our work in English and inspired by the work of Karla Schuster. As part of this process, we have had the opportunity to do some mark-making to music and use colourful inks.



In science, we have been learning all about the different teeth we have and the jobs they do. We carried out an experiment on eggshells (as they are similar to teeth enamel) to see what the effect of different drinks was on our teeth. Since then, we have also been learning all about our digestive system – we drew around each other on large pieces of paper and labelled all of the organs that are part of our digestive systems.




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## Year 5

Last term, in order to bring our geography learning about slums to life, Year 5 had the opportunity to learn about a charity that helps children and their families in the slums of Manila, Philippines. We were excited to have Melissa Villa, the cofounder of Project Pearls, join us on Teams for an interview and question and answer time.

We had a preloved toy and games stall at the Christmas Fair from toys collected in a very short time by the year 5 classes. Project Pearls have received a grand total of £230. This is an amazing amount. As a year group, we have been able to adopt 16 families for Christmas. In science, we have been looking at properties and materials. We have loved being able to carry out experiments and in one lesson we investigated the rate of oxidation on apples when different substances were applied.









#### **Reception Buddies**

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# Year 6

What an exciting and busy term Year 6 have had! It has been brilliant to get stuck into some really interesting learning and seeing children's enthusiasm for art, maths and science. In November, our legacy learning was in full swing when we raised money and awareness for the Royal British Legion. On Remembrance Day, the children led a very moving worship: Oak class taught the younger children about Armistice Day and why we wear poppies; Maple class recited Flanders Field with empathy and prosody; and Willow class led the school in prayers and remembrance. We were so proud of how the children behaved as role models on this important day. We were also lucky enough to have a visit from a member of the Royal British Legion who really sparked the children's interests.





In History, children have enjoyed learning about World War 2 and many have brought in artefacts and primary sources from home to enhance their learning. In English, we have enjoyed reading Friend or Foe by Michael Morpurgo. This book has inspired us when writing letters, diary entries and narratives about the main characters, who are evacuees.

As announced last term, we have been very fortunate to be able to fund some additional support from PH Sports during our morning play times. This has meant that children are able to access the equipment from our play shed during these times in addition to lunch times. It has been so wonderful to see the children loving our play time equipment, particular favourites include giant Jenga and the scoop spades! We have also been delighted to re-introduce some external PE events. A group of children from year 5 and 6 were able to attend a sports hall athletics event at Gordano this term, competing against 5 other local schools. #### Mayfly Class Prayer (read by Alice)


